

A Look back at the March & April Meetings

March found us listening wrapt to Lorraine Johnson, the City Gardener, who has tapped into the current urban gardening craze. There are lots of ways to grow vegetables in the city, from balcony pots to large green spaces but we also heard about some different growing spaces that you might not have thought about before. Finally, we talked about all the different kinds of vegetables that can grow in small spaces, from beans in pots trained up walls, to squash and zucchini strung along a fence. April ~ Reminder of Buckets & Bounty in the Garden

Talk was given by James Graham

A reminder of some helpful tips and tricks given to us by James Graham:

- Create a mini greenhouse out of a large water bottle ~ fill it with lettuce seeds and put it outside mid-February and by the first of May you will have your first crop of greens
- How to prep pots for plantings ~ start with paper in the bottom (James like the LCBO paper best), layer in some soil, next is some un-composted compost and finish off with more soil ~ now your pots are ready to be planted
- Banana peels help keep aphids away
- Pepper plants love the warmth of growing in pots
- Leave the bean plants in your garden when you have completed the harvest. Then do the "Bean Stomp". Return the nitrogen to the soil
- Rhubarb ~ eat only the stems and feed to the leaves back to the plant
- After harvesting butternut squash wait 6 weeks before eating to completely develop the sweetness

These are just a few of the amazing things Graham shared with us. His take away message - it's your garden do what you love, grow what you want.

Kill Slugs on your Hostas

1 part cleaning ammonia

9 parts water

Mix and pour on plants in spring

Turns into a mild Fertilizer

First Place Winner~ Other Preserve Category Apple Rhubarb Chutney (from the Bernardin Complete book of Home Preserving)

Makes about four 8-ounce (250 ml) jars

4 cups diced peeled cored apples, treated to prevent browning

4 cups granulated sugar

2 cups diced rhubarb, fresh or frozen

1/2 cup water

Grated zest and juice of 1 lemon

1/2 cup dried cranberries 1 tsp ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg



- In a large stainless steel saucepan, combine, apples, sugar, rhubarb, water and lemon zest and juice. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat, stirring constantly. Reduce heat and boil gently, stirring frequently, for 15 minutes. Add cranberries, cinnamon and nutmeg.
 Boil gently, stirring frequently, until thick enough to mound on a spoon, about 15 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile prepare canner, jars and lids.
- 3. Ladle hot chutney into hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Remove air bubbles and adjust headspace, if necessary, by adding hot chutney. Wipe rim. Center lid on jar. Screw band down until resistance is met, then increase to fingertip-tight.
- 4. Place jars in canner, ensuring they are completely covered with water. Bring to boil and process for 10 minutes. Remove canner lid. Wait 5 minutes, then remove jars, cool and store.

TIPS: For good textured chutney, choose firm cooking apples that keep their shape during cooking, such as Golden Delicious or Spartan.

When boiling sauces, chutneys and salsas that thicken as the moisture is evaporated, you may need to gradually reduce the heat to maintain a low boil and prevent scorching.
