# Thursday, September 20th, 2012, 7:30 p.m. Topic: Gardening in the Shade Speaker: Anna Leggatt

Anna is currently employed as a Nature Interpreter at the Kortright Centre for Conservation - This includes quite a bit of identification of plants and animals in the field. She teaches occasionally at the Toronto Botanical Garden (Civic Garden Centre) - from general gardening to more specialized courses such as Water and Rock gardening. Anna has written articles in Toronto Life Gardening, Landscape Ontario and The Globe and Mail. Also in Trellis (the Toronto Botanical Garden's publication,) The Journal of the Ontario Rock Garden Society, NARGS and other non-profit organizations.

Anna says; "I am basically a mad gardener, gardening in a comparatively large garden in Toronto with lots of shade and deer and groundhogs. I love shrubs, bulbs, rock gardening, wildflowers, Japanese effects, working with stone and changing my garden design. I want to grow vegetables. However, deer and groundhog would like me to as well."

### Topic: Gesneriads - beyond African Violets Speaker: Vincent Woo

Born to Chinese immigrant parents in Edmonton, Vincent got the gesneriad bug while a teenager, starting first with miniature violets and then graduating to the rest of the gesneriad family. He moved to Toronto for medical school at U of T in 1992 and stayed for Psychiatry training. During that time he joined the Toronto Gesneriad Society and met some wonderful growers, who encouraged him to continue to grow despite a busy schedule. Vincent did take a break from Medicine in 2003 and 2005 to pursue a degree in Botany in New Zealand, to study its only native gesneriad, Rhadothamnus. There he learned that almost falling off a waterfall in pursuit of a plant was not a good thing, and that he really missed Canada.

In Toronto, Vincent continues to be involved in plant shows and talks, and enjoys growing new species from seeds. Having recently bought a house, with the opportunity to do outdoor gardening for the first time, Vincent has been indulging in his enjoyment of perennials, collecting as many variegated forms as possible, as well as alpine gesneriads, Ramonda and Haberlea."



### The Amazing Monkey Orchid

Nature doesn't need an audience. These wonderful orchids come from the south-eastern Ecuadorian and Peruvian cloud forests from elevations of 1000 to 2000 meters and as such not many people throughout history got to see them. However, thanks to intrepid collectors we do get to see this wonderful Monkey Orchid. Someone didn't need much imagination to name it though, let's face it.





Its scientific name is Dracula simia, the last part nodding towards the fact that this remarkable orchid bears more than a passing resemblance to a monkey's face – although we won't go as far as to be species specific on this one. The Dracula (genus) part of its name refers to the strange characteristic of the two long spurs of the sepals, reminiscent of the fangs of a certain Transylvanian count of film and fiction fame.

The orchid was only named in 1978 by the botanist Luer but is in a family containing over 120 species mostly found in Ecuador. Up in the cloud mountains the monkey orchid can flower at any time – it is not season specific. It

scent resembles that of a ripe orange.

The examples seen here are all cultivated – though it remains very rare in 'captivity'. For that reason don't make a dash down to your local horticultur-

alist. Yet for those lucky enough to have one, if kept quite cool and in partial shade and it can thrive and flower. Like all orchids, however, it needs a lot of care and patience – so you may want to consider a cactus

### Fall Photo Contest Categories ~ Are you taking your pictures?

I hope that you're also taking photos for the **Fall Photo Contest.** This year we're giving you an opportunity to show more of your shots that aren't necessarily garden related, with five horticultural and seven "general" categories:

- Inside a Flower A seriously close close-up of a flower. Photos in this category show the inside of the flower and nothing else.
- Cactuses and other succulents We're not going to give you a definition here, but if your subject has to be watered every day, it's probably not one of these.
- Harvest Time The category name says it all.
- The World of Mycology Mushrooms and other funguses.
- Anything Grows (Any horticultural subject) This is a children's (6-10 years) and youth (11-17 years) category.
- **Spiderwebs** With or without the spider, but remember that the focus is the web, not the spider.
- Rocks One or more of these items that so many of us love to have in our gardens.
- **Insects** Note that these are the six-legged creatures that we see every day spiders, centipedes, snails, etc., are not included.
- In the Forest A photo that leaves no doubt that it was taken in or of a forest, so obviously it must include trees.
- Life in the Swamp Frogs, turtles, the Creature From the Black Lagoon, or that goopy green stuff that we see floating if it's alive and in a swamp, it's a suitable subject for this category.
- Shadows We leave this up to your interpretation. Just make sure that the centre of attention is a shadow (or shadows).
- Black & White Any subject, using only black, white, and shades of grey.

### A Couple of notes about the Fall Photo Contest by Malcolm Geast

In the July/August newsletter, I described the category Rocks as "One or more of these items that so many of us love to have in our gardens." This was not meant to imply that the rock or rocks in your photo must be in a garden. The only stipulation is that they (or it) must be detached from the earth's crust – the Rock of Gibraltar doesn't qualify.

A good photo comes about sometimes by good luck. But more often, it's the result of your careful thought about the subject and the lighting, and camera details such as the exposure, shutter speed and aperture. Perhaps you've also cropped the photo to take out distracting or unnecessary material off to the side of the main subject. Now it's time to enter the photo in the contest. Unfortunately, this is also the time that many good photos are unnecessarily spoiled by trying to save a few minutes or a few pennies. The printers that are attached to our computers can do an excellent job of putting those photos on paper. But all too often, we see photos that look not nearly as attractive or striking as they could, the result of using low-quality photo paper or a printer that isn't working perfectly. Take a close look at the photos that you're entering in the contest – if you're not getting the proper quality by printing at home, consider getting your entries printed commercially. Gone are the days when they cost several dollars each; these days, good quality prints are less than a dollar each, usually less than 50¢. You can get them done at many supermarkets, department stores, and of course, at camera stores. And considering the price of paper and ink, this may even be cheaper than printing at home.

Entries for the Fall Photo Contest will be accepted at the October 18 EYGC meeting, with awards presented at the Club's Annual Meeting on November 15. Entry forms will be available at the September meeting and on our website (eygc.ca).
