Topic: Spring Flowing Blubs—Plant a Spectacular Spring Garden Now Speaker: Dugald Cameron of Gardenimport

With a bit of energy this autumn and some tips and tricks from Dugald Cameron, everyone can have an exciting flowering garden from the first to the last day of spring. Learn about how, when and where to plant bulbs along with insight as to what bulbs are old and faithful and a peek at what is new and delightful.

Dugald Cameron is co-founder, owner and president of Gardenimport, a mail order nursery founded in 1983 when he couldn't find the variety or quality of bulbs seeds and plants he wanted for his garden. His search for the very best has led to close connections to many of the world's leading hybridizers. Since that time he has introduced countless new bulbs, seeds and plants to Canadian gardeners from coast to coast.

Ann McIlmoyle, a scientist and the owner and manager of Waymac Farms since 1991, and a regular vendor at the East York Farmer's Market, will be speaking about growing Shiitake mushrooms on the farm and how you can do it at home!

Ann's spectacular educational and life background have made her an expert in the nutritional and health benefits of Shiitake mushrooms. The farm has grown shiitake mushrooms largely for the wholesale marketplace since 1991. They also continue to diversify their mushroom production growing other types of mushrooms for sale in the marketplace. Since 1991, Waymac Farms has been honoured with several awards.

Ann McIlmoyle is a scientist and lecturer and was an award-winning Secondary School science teacher, Head of Science. A mentor of many National and International award-winning science projects as well as projects that placed top in Canadian and International Science and Engineering fairs.

Ann will have available for purchase: some Shiitake logs (\$25) for personal production of Shiitake mushrooms and her new cookbook "Farmers' Market Favourite Mushroom Recipes" (\$20).


