

Proposed Cha- ges to EYGC By-Laws

The Executive is proposed a couple of changes to our by-laws. These will be announced at the September meeting and the membership in attendance at the November Annual General Meeting will be asked to approve the proposed changes.

The first change is regarding fees for new first-time members. Traditionally, we have allowed people joining after July to pay one-half of the fees. However, the Ontario Horticultural Association does not allow this practice.

By-law 3. c. "The fees for any new first-time member joining between July 1 and September 30 shall be half of the regular fees."

Proposed Cha-ge: Eliminate this line.

The other proposed change is to the number of Executive meetings. Email has changed the need for quite so many meetings, and we find we are able to get a lot done without meeting in person.

- 6. Meetings
- a. Excepting August and December, general meetings of the Club are to be held each month, on the third Thursday of the month. The Executive Board may decide to hold additional general meetings.

Proposed Cha-ge: A minimum of 10 executive board meetings to be held in the calendar year. The Executive Board may decide to hold additional general meetings.

6. d. Meetings of the Executive Board are to be held at least once a month. The agenda of the December meeting shall include planning of events for the following year.

Proposed Cha-ge: Remove this paragraph.

This is why we have proposed changes to the by-laws which state we must meet every month. 


ing them together was stunning). Carol Bouley won Best Design for her 'Chile: Bottoms Up' design incorporating a wine bottle. Well done to all.

Pumpkin Carving Contest


While we only had 4 entries last year, they were top-notch! Perhaps this is your year to try your hand at carving a pumpkin for the competition.
