We were just awarded a \$250.00 grant from the OHA District 5 to help us rejuvenate our now 12-year project. We have to document our changes and report back at the end of the year. We would like it if more members would join us on the Rockery to have many hands make light work.

East York Garden Club represents community—we are linked together by the garden, but the fellowship, the inter-



ests along with the camaraderie and the collaboration of volunteering together makes East York an even better place to live.

## May Plant Sale ~ How to prepare your Plants for Sale!



The May Members' Plant Sale is always a busy event. Please try to have your plants at the meeting by 7:00 pm so they can be priced. If you have any garden tools in good condition that you'd like to donate, those are welcome too.

#### Some pointers:

- Decide early what plants will go in the sale.
- A healthy attractive plant will sell faster than a plant that is potted up the day before or the morning of the sale. A plant that was potted up and kept watered in a shady spot for more than a few weeks should put up some new growth.
- Clearly label your plant with its proper name. Don't guess. Identify it.
- If you have the nursery label it originally came with mark it on your tag using the botanical name and cultivar. It will give the buyer more information about the plant.
- Does it need sun or shade? That is important information.
- Does it need lots of water or is it a drought tolerant plant that can survive on the dry side?
- Make sure there are no weeds or add on's. A buyer may not appreciate getting a sprig of goutweed or lily of the valley in with the sale plant. They can be aggressive plants once established.







### Line Design Workshop Day




house on the afternoon of Sunday April 3<sup>rd</sup> to learn the basics of creating Line Designs with our teacher, Ursula Eley.




#### Royal York Hotel Afternoon Tea? Interested?



## Flower Show Trophies & Awards You Can Win—Yes, you!!

Every year there are award presentations at our end-of-the-year AGM in November. This includes cash prizes for show points as outlined in the Flower Show Rules in your yearbook. This is a reminder of our trophies and awards possibilities for competitors:

We have the "Anna Leggatt Novice Award" that is awarded to the novice who wins the highest number of points in the monthly and annual shows. To be eligible, a member cannot have won a first prize in an EYGC flower show prior to the current year.

We have the "Betty Meyers Best Cut Specimen Award" of \$5 which is awarded to each member who receives the judge's Best Cut Specimen at each of our regular monthly shows—April, June and September.

Finally, we have the "George S. Henry Trophy" which is awarded to the member with the highest number of aggregate points in both Horticulture and Design classes in the monthly and annual shows.

## Points from the Canadian Master Gardener Conference:

Keep succulents dry in winter.

Cut the tops off when they get too tall. Leave dry till they start growing roots. Then pot it in porous soil.

Put some dirt in a watering can to speed up chlorine breakdown in tap water.

Water from thunderstorms is better oxygenated - contains more ozone.

Use wood-chips to mulch under trees, not cedar bark. Tree growth is much better.


Sensitive plants learn. They stop dropping their leaves after about a month of tapping them.

Yellowstone rivers became straighter after wolves were introduced!

The wolves altered elk behaviour and moved them out of fertile valleys and into more sheltered areas, which allowed the willow and aspen trees along the rivers to grow taller. Fewer elk (and more skittish ones among the remaining population) increased the number of berries, which has been good for bears. It has meant more food for rabbits and mice, which has meant more hawks and eagles. More beavers have been able to eat the healthier trees, and their dams provide habitats for many animals. The dams and the trees' deeper roots have made Yellowstone's rivers healthier and swifter. Therefore straighter.
