My Favourite Perennial

Asclepias tuberosa, also known as Butterfly Weed or Pleurisy Root.

I love this plant for the bright, showy, tangerine orange flowers and the fact that it's a magnet for butterflies, humming birds, bees and other pollinators.

It is recognized as a native North American plant, part of the milkweed family. The plant's genus is named after Asclepias, the Greek god of healing. Native people used it as a medicinal plant.

It is considered low maintenance. Needs full sun but is drought tolerant. Blooms from June to August but with deadheading you can get another bloom cycle. Grows 2-3 ft. high and spreads 1-1.5 ft. wide. It does not like being transplanted because of its taproot and is best left undisturbed once established. I have had my plant for about 4 years and it behaves nicely.



You might consider adding Asclepias to your garden this year. It has been named 2017 Perennial Plant of the Year and The Canadian Wildlife Federation has teamed up with Medallion Plants to promote plant kits that attract pollinators to your garden. One of the kits featured is a two-pack of Asclepias plants. Look for them in stores this spring.

Container Gardening for Your Outdoor Table by Michael Woods







Red, Orange, Yellow & Terra Cotta

I love gardening and growing plants in the garden, but I also really love container gardening too, because of the flexibility it gives you. You can move the containers around to suit your layout, or to suit their sun requirements, and you can use them to give you a pop of colour wherever you need it. Certainly, the end of our driveway was a real dead zone until I filled it with containers.

One of my favourite ways to container garden is to make "mini" tabletop containers as centrepieces for the table on our deck. Our deck is fairly shady, so when not being used as a centrepiece, the container can live on the patio to get more sun. I like to include herbs and some culinary plants in the tabletop containers, so that they can add their colours & aromas to the dining experience. I have even had dinner guests pinch some fresh herb leaves off to add to their plate!

You may have to replace the odd plant throughout the season, but that's still a lot less expensive that buying fresh cut flowers for the table when guests come over.

In addition to choosing specific themes, you can select your containers and plants to colour coordinate with your china and glassware, for a real dramatic effect. Being a bit of a collector of glassware and china myself, I like the way they can compliment each other, and it also encourages you to bring out those pieces that have been unused at the back of the china cabinet for far too long. Here are some examples of tabletop containers, and table settings. These focus on particular colour schemes, but you can dream up your own themes:

EYCG May Plant *fale* Tips:

The May Members' Plant ſale is always a busy event. Please try to have your plants at the meeting between 6:30 and 7:00 pm so they can be priced and displayed. Please provide as much information as possible about what growing conditions your plants like. *Native plants are especially welcome!*

Some pointers:

- Decide early what plants will go in the sale.
- A healthy attractive plant will sell faster than a plant that is potted up the day before or the morning of the sale. A plant that was potted up and kept watered in a shady spot for more than a few weeks should put up some new growth.
- Clearly label your plant with its proper name. Don't guess. Identify it.
- If you have the nursery label it originally came with mark it on your tag using the botanical name and cultivar. It will give the buyer more information about the plant.
- Does it need sun or shade? That is important information.
- Does it need lots of water or is it a drought tolerant plant that can survive on the dry side?
- Make sure there are no weeds or add-ons. A buyer may not appreciate getting a sprig of goutweed or lily of the valley in with the sale plant. They can be aggressive plants once established.
- If applicable to your plant (e.g. shrubs or some perennials), bare-rooting is allowed.
- When buying plants at the sale, please total up your purchases **before** going to the checkout.

It's Pop-Up Time!

Start thinking about popping-up your garden. Maybe your garden has some of the Ontario wildflowers, known as ephemerals. These short term, perennial plants quickly emerge in the spring and die back to their underground parts after managing to leaf out, bloom, go to seed and generally delight everyone who sees them.

Examples are: Dutchman's Breeches (Dicentra cucullaria); Bloodroot (Sanguinaria Canadensis); Jack-in-the-pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum); Trout Lily (Erythronium americanum); Spring Beauty (Claytonia virginica); Round-leaved Hepatica (Hepatica americana) and White Trillium (Trillium grandiflorum).



Recipe for May-June Issue

Those of us lucky enough to have a patch of rhubarb growing in our garden, will soon be picking the first rhubarb of the season. There are many ways to prepare rhubarb, from simple stewing to elaborate jams and jellies. Everyone has their favourite, and one of my favourite rhubarb recipes comes from my friend Alicia, and she will be the first to say that she got it from her Mom. This unusual recipe combines raisins with the rhubarb (sweet & sour), and is delicious!

<u>Alicia's Rhubarb Raisin Pie</u>

- 4 cups diced rhubarb stalks
- 2 cups raisins
- ♦ ¾ cup white sugar
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 2 eggs lightly beaten
- 1 tbsp. grated lemon rind
- 2 tbsp. lemon juice
 &

Pastry for a 2-crust pie

Cover rhubarb and raisins with boiling water for 5 minutes and then drain well.

Divide the pastry equally, and roll out two circles, one for the top, and one for the bottom. Line a 9" pie plate with one of the pieces.

Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt; sprinkle half on the bottom of the pie shell. Add the drained rhubarb and raisin mixture.

Blend the lemon rind, juice, eggs and remaining sugar/ cornstarch mixture, and pour over the rhubarb. Cover with the top crust and crimp edge.

Bake at 450F for 15 minutes then at 350F until golden brown, approximately 25 to 30 minutes.

What is a Sunchoke?

ANSWER:

Many people were asking about the recipe in the last newsletter which called for "sunchokes". The recipe was submitted by our speaker at the February meeting, *Signe Langford*, who spoke about happy hens and fresh eggs. The recipe is from her book about cooking with native and naturalized edibles.

The Sunchoke is another name for the Jerusalem Artichoke. The following definition is courtesy of *Wikipedia:*

"The Jerusalem artichoke (Helianthus tuberosus), also called sunroot, sunchoke, earth apple or topinambour, is a species of sunflower native to eastern North America, and found from eastern Canada and Maine west to North Dakota, and south to northern Florida and Texas. It is also cultivated widely across the temperate zone for its tuber, which is used as a root vegetable."

It is nearby this year!


Our District is the host for this year's convention, so if you have never attended, it is the closest to home for a few years yet.
