### Flower Show Changes for 2019

The Flower Show Committee has made a few changes to the 2019 Flower Show schedule and a few reminders:

- We will not be having a Preserves competition this year.
- Entries for the monthly shows (April, June and September) will be **restricted to only one entry per competitor per class**
- For each of the monthly shows (April, June and September) we continue to have a class in the "Cut Specimens" section that is just for first-timers. These first-timers have NEVER competed in a show prior to 2019. This is to get them/you to dip your toes and compete amongst yourselves. The entries will be judged based on the same criteria as the rest of the classes, but some helpful information from the judge and show chairs may be written on your entry tag. These first-timers may also fully compete in all other classes. The first-timers are considered first-timers for all 2019 shows.
- There are a few tweaks to the cut specimen sections. Please fully read through the Flower Show Schedule in the yearbook to see any changes.


