On a chilly Saturday April 27th, 17 enthusiastic EYGC members made their way to Markham for the District 5 Annual General Meeting, hosted by Markham Garden & Horticultural Society.

It was a wonderful day starting with a delicious registration buffet, official greetings from the Town of Markham from their Town Crier in full regalia and the business part of the day. Malcolm Geast was given a gift from OHA as thanks for being the Editor of the Trillium newsletter. He is stepping down after the summer edition. We also heard that District 5 members contributed 38,525 hours of volunteer work in 2018!

There were door prizes provided by each society within District 5, two interesting and inspiring speakers—David Leeman with his back room tour of Kew Gardens in London with their wonderful compost heaps, and Lorraine Johnson speaking on the stewardship of the land we garden with some incredible statistics.

There was a special presentation by Lake Simcoe Gardeners giving us a peek at next year's D5AGM that they will be hosting with the theme: "Who Speaks For The Trees?". It was poetic, amusing and seeing a group of their members dressed as trees with incredible headdresses was memorable.

A great boxed lunch with lots of time to view the flower show and publications competition. There were many purchasers of tickets for the over 60 draw prizes gathered by the Markham Garden & Horticultural Society from businesses, members and local artists.

There were 115 horticulture entries and 54 design entries in the flower show and Markham won the Dave Money Horticulture Award this year.

Many of our members won door and draw prizes. We entered 18 specimens and won 14 ribbons plus Daisy Auer's Flowering Maple won Best in Show! Thank you to Cristina Brown and Vera Stoyanoff for collecting and encouraging entries and for all our members who entered the show.



Our yearbook, bookmark and an edition of our newsletter all received 3rd place ribbons.

It was an educational and delightful day spent not only with so many of our members, but fellow gardeners from around the district.

Volunteers arrived around 6:10pm. Three volunteers were assigned to assist members in taking plants in from their vehicles. Pricing of the plants went smoothly as there were four volunteers. Three volunteers were assigned to take plants from pricing to the various tables. Three volunteers put up signs on the tables (i.e. sunny plants, native plants) and prices of plants. Two volunteers tallied up purchases and two volunteers were on cash-out. Our speaker provided valuable information on the various plants prior to the sale.

Total sales were \$512.00 (last year \$653.00) and this included \$97.00 from the auctioned plants. 91 members attended the sale.

The layout of the tables at the front of the room provided for easier viewing, less crowding, and gave all members an opportunity to purchase plants.

In the last issue I wrote an article about the "Garden Scheme Books" that they publish in the UK outlining private gardens that are open a few days a year for charity. Alan and I were in Scotland for 5 weeks in May/June of this year and we tried out the garden scheme books for England and Scotland.

We saw a few delightful gardens listed in the books, but the books would really be most useful if you were spending an extended period there, say a couple of months. You have to match where you are with gardens that are open when you're there. If they are only open for a day or two (like many of them) it can be quite difficult logistically to achieve that, especially factoring in that some gardens may not hold a strong interest for you. The books really are for people who live in the UK, but it was fun trying to see some of these private gardens.
