2024 Flower Shows—What's New

New this year! The Jean Quinn Design Trophy will be awarded to the member with the highest number of points in the design classes of the annual and monthly shows.

A native plant class has been added to Section A for all four flower shows. The definition of a native plant is a plant species indigenous to Canada prior to the arrival of the first Europeans.

You may bring your entries starting at 6:30 pm to 7:15 pm. Judging starts promptly at 7:20 pm. Flower show entries may be removed no earlier than 15 minutes after the end of the meeting to allow members to view the show.

EYGC Garden Pop-Ups: a How-to Guide

What is a garden pop-up?

It all started in 2015 when member and Board Director, Diane Ronan, suggested random garden tours at times convenient to the member-homeowner. This would replace the large one-day, multi-garden, superorganized garden tour. The Pop-up Garden was born and it blossomed!

Who may attend a pop-up? These are members-only events so do plan to car-pool with other club members, but do not bring friends or life partner (do encourage your friends & partner to join the club!) as having access to Pop-ups is a benefit of membership and our OHA insurance is limited to members. EYGC visitors will be asked to sign an attendance sheet.

I am interested in 'popping-up' my garden- what do I do?

Great! In our experience, hosts find the experience of sharing their garden very rewarding.

- 1. First, choose when you would like to open your garden and consider if there are specific flowers, shrubs or plants you would like to show which will help decide on approximate timing. You may choose to open more than once a year so members may see the seasonal changes.
- 2. If you are nervous about taking the plunge, contact our Pop-up coordinators Beth Binnington or Barb Fairbanks (contacts below, or approach them at a meeting) for encouragement.
- 3. Pick a day and time(s) example, Wednesday from 4-6PM, or Saturday 10AM-noon AND 2-4PM. Phone or email Beth and/or Barb. Aim to give at least 3 days' notice so the Pop-up committee can respond and get an email out to the club members.
- 4. Provide a brief description of what visitors will see (a magnolia in bloom, flowering bulbs, a fish pond, a native plant garden, etc.), whether there are any accessibility issues (sloping ground, steep steps), and your address. It's nice to include a photo for the email announcement but this is optional.

Anything else?

We do ask that you keep any pets in the house for the duration of your Pop-up.

You'll be asked to post 3 items. These can be emailed if you have a printer or dropped off if not.

- 1. a visitor sign-up sheet which will be collected afterward.
- 2. a notice to visitors that photos may be taken, and they may be in them, and used in club media, newsletters.
- 3. a general caution notice to visitors that there may be uneven ground or slopes.

Fun Facts about \(\int \) quirrels

I used to feel that squirrels were a nuisance. They chewed our roof shingles, wooden fences, our brand-new composite window frames (yikes!), and they dug up our grass and garden bulbs.

My attitude changed once I became interested in gardening, wildlife and when we started sharing our backyard 15 years ago with several pure albino (white) squirrels.



Over the 39 years that we have lived at our current address in Topham Park, we have had many squirrels who made their nests in evergreen and deciduous trees, in our front and backyards and even once in an arbour on the back deck.

Here are some Fun Facts about squirrels:

- 1. Squirrels can jump vertically five feet and can leap between objects that are over ten feet apart.
- 2. Squirrels can sprint faster than you.
- 3. Squirrels are good swimmers.
- 4. A squirrel nest is called a drey. It looks like a leafy piñata in a tree.
- 5. Mama squirrels can have up to 2 litters per year. Female squirrels pull out their own fur to line their nest. The fur ensures that their babies stay warm and dry on cold spring and autumn nights. See the picture of the black squirrel with the missing fur and her 2 babies.
- 6. Baby squirrels leave their mother after 12 weeks and can start having babies of their own at 11 months.
- 7. Albino and black squirrels are not a species of their own but are just eastern grey squirrels with gene mutations. For the albino squirrel, this can lead to full or partial albinism, which also gives them poor eyesight and makes them more prone to things like missing an easy jump to a nearby branch. Unfortunately, Topham Park's albino squirrel was found on the road, lifeless; it appeared to have lost its balance and fallen from the wire onto the road. See the picture of the albino squirrel we named Sugar.
- 8. Apparently one in every one hundred thousand squirrels born is albino. We were lucky enough to have had 3 romping around our neighbourhood for many years.

So, for all you gardeners who are frustrated by their sometimes-destructive behaviour, they also have a very beneficial purpose: squirrels are nature's foresters. According to researchers, squirrels tend to forget about 10% of the nuts that they bury. By spreading and burying tree nuts (like acorns and chestnuts), it's estimated that squirrels plant millions of trees each year in North America alone!

Winter Sowing

At the EYGC meeting In January, Heather Whetstone held a very interesting presentation and demonstrated her method of winter sowing. She talked about planting flower seeds and perennials in recycled plastic containers outside in the winter.

A friend of one of our members who lives in Toronto has also enjoyed winter sowing. However, instead of flowers and annuals, she has had a huge success with a variety of vegetable seeds.

Like Heather, she has used a wide range of recycled plastic containers and has also had great success using Ziploc baggies.

There are some very good websites to check out about planting with zip-lock bags. Example: Trudy Davidoff - winter sowing of seeds the easy way.

If you are interested in starting your garden early and saving money, just buy seeds and potting soil and start your garden early in recycled plastic containers outside in the winter!!

There are many resources on YouTube demonstrating this method of winter sowing. Examples: <u>Wintersown.org</u> and Sheryl Mann – winter sowing versus winter growing.

Winter Sowing is a cheap & easy way to start seeds ... outside with minimal effort!!

Advantages: You can have your garden ready:

- Earlier than before the stores have the plants ready for sale.
- Save money by only having to buy seeds.
- Have a wider variety of vegetables (and so many more seeds)!
- And the seedlings don't need to adjust to the conditions before planting in your garden as they
 are naturally acclimated to the outside temperatures.



Meet a Returning Board Member

Diane moved to East York in 2000 and saw a notice about our garden club in the local Mirror newspaper. An avid novice, she has two notebooks full of information gathered at our meetings. She also took a horticultural class at Greenwood High School. Her father grew vegetables and flowers in their small family garden, which explains her love of geraniums and marigolds. She took a workshop last year from Dorte Windmuller and is starting to add more native plants to her garden.

Diane joined the board last year as a Director and is part of the committee that organizes our excellent roster of speakers. She was also on the board several years ago and served on a committee to plan the OHA District 5 AGM. She has volunteered with a variety of activities including assisting Barb Foster to organize the refreshments for our annual August Tea.

Flower Show Rules

Entries will be received between 7:30 and 9:00am sharp and may be removed after 3:00pm. District 5 Entry tags will be provided. Please complete all information, including Society name

- 1. This competition is open to all members in good standing of Societies in District 5.
- 2. Each Society is allowed a maximum of two entries in A and B class, and one entry per decade for C Class.
- All entries will be judged according to Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards, 2019. Please refer to this guide for further information.
- 4. The decisions of Judges and Show Chair are final.
- 5. Best of Show and Judges's Choice will be awarded in sections A through C.
- 6. Houseplants must have been grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of three months prior to exhibiting. They should be well established and mature.
- 7. The exhibitor must supply containers for horticultural exhibits.
- 8. In design classes, any type of fresh, dried and/or treated plant material may be used. Plant material may be obtained from any source. No artificial plant material may be used.
- Accessories are permitted with all designs. Wiring and taping of flowers is permitted if it does not show, otherwise points will be deducted.
- 10. Ribbons will be awarded for all classes.
- 12. We reserve the right to change the class and/or section number on an entry tag if we find the entry is incorrectly entered. This will benefit the entrant.
- 13. The District 5 Design Trophy will be presented to the Society with the highest points in Design Classes.
- 14. The District 5 Horticultural Trophy will be presented to the Society with the highest combined points in Horticultural Classes.
- 15. The Dave and Bev Money Award will be awarded to the Society with the highest combined points in Horticultural and Design Classes.
