## Thursday, October 21, 2004

#### **Round Table Discussions**

October is the time for our annual round-table discussions. This year we'll have three Master Gardeners, covering the subjects of Last-Minute Planting, Forcing Bulbs for Winter Bloom, and Care of Christmas Plants. We'll also have a discussion about the Club's direction for 2005.

It's also the time for our annual seed exchange, and the closing date for the photography contest. (You'll find more information about both of these on the next page.) As well, David Leeman, from the Toronto & Parkdale Hort Society will be selling spring bulbs, as he has done for the past few years.

Members whose surnames begin with T, U, V, or W are asked to bring some cookies or sweets for the evening's tea.

## Saturday, October 16, 2004

#### Seed Collecting at the Rockery - 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

On Sunday, October 17, the Rockery group will be taking a few hours (10 a.m. to 1 p.m.) to get the Rockery ready for winter, and to plant some bulbs for the spring. On Saturday, members and friends will have the opportunity to collect seeds with Glen Hutzul, and to pick up a few tips at the same time. Many seeds will be ripe enough (and dry enough). Others will be immature or too wet. If you are a novice, come out and learn the basics. That includes learning which of the plants have seeds that will flower true (that is, the seedlings will flower with the same characteristics as the parent plant).

There are a great variety of flowers with seeds in the Rockery: coneflowers (pink), blue thistle, Gaillardia, Veronica (pink, blue, dwarf), French marigolds (orange and yellow), dwarf border dahlias, four o'clocks (rose), red geraniums and snapdragons (bicoloured burgundy).

Please bring pruners or secateurs (to trim off seed heads) and containers (to hold the seeds).
