You can help us make the sale easier by bringing in your plants in containers, with their names and colours identified. If your plant is unusual or rare, please suggest a price. This is a great opportunity to purchase East York plants, those that grow well in our district – and at a very reasonable price!

As we've done for the past couple of years, along with the plants, we'll be selling Garden Treasures. All the accessories that go with gardening: garden books, pots & planters, tools, lanterns, candle holders, anything and everything that you would use in the garden. If your shed or garage is becoming a place where you store tools that are useful, but no longer used, we welcome your donations. Whether it's trowels, forks, pruners, books, or garden ornaments, if you have still-usable gardening items that you don't use anymore, bring them along on Thursday evening. These items go on sale at 7:00 p.m, so the earlier you get there, the better the selection.

The plant sale begins when the evening's presentations are finished, likely between 8:30 and 8:45. We'll be cutting the prices near the end of the sale, but to make sure you get the plant you really want, make sure you buy it early. There are usually incredible bargains for the beginning gardener. With a central cashier and colour-coded price stickers on every plant, it should be easy and quick to pick up and pay for your treasures!

2006 Garden Tour

Our 2006 garden tour, **The Alluring Gardens of East York** will be taking place on Sunday, June 25, running from noon to 5:00 p.m. There are 12 gardens on the tour, including an English-style perennial garden, ravine gardens, cottage gardens, shade gardens, and full-sun gardens. As well, you'll see ponds, native perennials, annuals, topiary, and some unusual, whimsical items.

Tickets are \$10 each, and are now available at three locations:

- •Bill's Garden Centre at 903 Pape Avenue (on the east side, one block south of Mortimer)
- Peter's Paint & Paper at 1062 Coxwell Avenue (on the west side, near O'Oconnor)
- Grassroots at 372 Danforth Avenue (on the north side, a few stores west of Chester)

And of course, we'll be selling them at our May and June meetings.

2006 Photo Contest

Spring – the time for our gardens to be reborn with new growth, as our favourite perennials reappear with wonderful green foliage and colourful flowers. But also appearing are some of our not-so-favourite weeds. This year, you can be happy to see some of those uninvited interlopers. Included in our photography contest in 2006 is a category dedicated to weeds. This is your opportunity to show that, while they too often show up in places we don't want them, weeds sometimes do have some attractive qualities.

Other categories in the contest are Captured Beauty, Water Feature, Wildflowers, Just Maples, Down the Garden Path, and Anything Grows. There are no added explanations with the category names this year – we're leaving it up you to give them your own interpretation. And, as in 2005, Anything Grows is split in two, one for those aged 6 to 10 and the other for 11 to 17 years old.

As we've mentioned before, this year we'll be presenting a trophy for the most points in the monthly flower shows. We'll also be awarding a new trophy for the most points in the Photography Contest. Points will be awarded in each category on

a 3-2-1 basis (3 for 1st place, 2 for 2nd, 1 for 3rd). We hope to be able to show you the award in September, but at this point, we're still looking for a name. "The EYGC Photo Contest Award" doesn't sound very exciting, and the other names we've thought of haven't been particularly inspiring. Let us know your suggestions for a name. We are quite happy to entertain any ideas.

2006 is the seventh year for the contest. This will also be its last in its current form. In 2007 we expect to make some interesting and exciting changes that we're sure will interest all members of the Club.

And of course, don't forget about the competitions at the OHA Convention in August. There are 11 categories in each of the photo, slide, and art competitions. A complete list can be found on the OHA's website (www.gardenontario.org). We'll also have information available at our May meeting. The closing date for entries is June 1. In 2005, Linda Boyko was first place winner in the category "A Tribute to Ontario". Let's see if we can have another winner this year!

The Front Yard Contest Blooms Again

Many of you will remember the Mayor's Blooming Contest, the competition which saw awards given to the most attractive and beautiful front yards in East York. Begun in the mid-eighties, it underwent a small name change after amalgamation (to the East York Blooming Contest), and then was dropped completely about five years ago. I'm happy to let you know that it looks like the competition will be returning this year.

At the moment the details have not been finalized. The organizing committee, which consists of two members of Janet Davis's office, two members of the City's Parks & Recreation department, and one member of our Club, will be working out the arrangements in the next week or two. But I can fill you in on some of the important aspects.

In the former contest, members of our Club and the Leaside Garden Society looked at every property in the borough, in order to come up with a rather long short-list of attractive front yards. These were then judged, and winners declared. This time, gardens will be nominated and then judged.

Since this is a new competition, and since we're starting at a relatively late date, the committee feels that it's best if we start small, with the hope of growing a little larger in the years to come. The area of eligible properties will include Wards 29 & 31 (i.e., those areas served by Councillors Case Ootes & Janet Davis).

Publicity and an awards presentation will largely be handled by the City of Toronto. Our main role will be to provide judges. Again, because we're still putting together some of the planning details, I'm not yet sure how we'll be handling this. However, it is my expectation that I'll be asking club members to do at least some of the judging. This will become clearer over the next few days, and I expect to be able to discuss it with some degree of certainty at the Club's May meeting.

But, in the meantime, take a look around, and think about which gardens (including your own) that you may wish to see nominated.

be \$15, and for a golf shirt, \$35.


